Policy, Campaigns and Communication Team

The policy and advocacy position has been busy this past month with a range of activities. Much of the work is aimed at making sure the perspectives of NUAU, its members and people who inject drugs are represented to other health care organisations as well as the broader community.

The 2009 Pharmacy Expo was held at Darling Harbour this month. In amongst all the companies spruiking their products and giving away show bags were a few presentations and forums that dealt with some of the more serious issues that pharmacists face. One of these sessions was about Community Pharmacy Pharmacotherapy Dosing. The session was aimed at giving potential dosing pharmacists some information about pharmacotherapies and about people who are on this treatment. Sione, NUAU's Policy Officer, spoke about the consumer experience of pharmacotherapy and about the advantages of being able to dose at a local chemist rather than a big clinic. This was a great opportunity to encourage more pharmacists to take up pharmacotherapy dosing and to set right some of the preconceptions and clichéd ideas some people have about pharmacotherapy treatment and about pharmacotherapy consumers. We had really

good feedback from the organisers and from many of the attending pharmacists. Hopefully this will lead to more chemists being willing to dose people. Being able to go to your local chemist and make picking up your dose a part of a shopping trip is a great change for people used to being buzzed in and out of dosing points and putting up with queues 20-people long!

The other major piece of work being undertaken by the policy worker this month is putting together NUAU's discussion paper on peer distribution of clean injecting equipment. This paper aims to raise some of the key issues around needle and syringe provision and distribution. At present it is not legal for one person to pass on a clean fit to another person in order to inject with it. Equipment may only be distributed by people authorised to do so by the NSW Health. So every time you help someone out with a clean fit you are breaking the law! In the context of the high rates of hepatitis C amongst people who inject drugs, this situation is farcical, dangerous and places users at needless risk.

The discussion paper will be out in July and will contain some recommendations and challenges for the health sector and the government.

Community Mobilisation Team

A very successful NUAAs Hunter Open Day was held on May 28 at ACON in Newcastle. There were many representatives from local services in attendance and it was an excellent opportunity for services to find out what NUAAs actually does and to develop partnerships.

The NUAAs Hunter Peerlink team completed the formal training sessions which involved a combined session with the peer educators and representatives from the local Needle and Syringe Program. There was positive involvement from service workers with the Peerlink team, and this can only lead to future good working partnerships. The peer educators have been working hard and will be holding some events in the coming months so keep your eyes open if you live in the Newcastle area.

We also commenced working with consumers from the Langton Clinic. A workshop was held on June 10 and 11. Consumers turned up to discuss ways to participate in the clinic and in their own treatment program. They discussed barriers to participation and how we could overcome some of these barriers. NUAAs staff then met with the service for a workshop about ways to involve consumers successfully and this will be followed by a combined consumer service workshop at the end of the month.

The Asian Project held an event at the Casula Powerhouse where they displayed all their art. Photos and posters describing all aspects of the project were on display. Certificates were handed out to all the peers involved. Everyone is really keen to keep going after July and to plan some great activities. Congrats to all involved.

So what else for the second half of 2009? We have a Consumer Participation event in Albury in mid-July where we will be looking for some keen people who want to be more involved in the local Needle and Syringe Program (NSP) to attend a series of workshops. AIVL, which is NUAAs's Canberra-based peak body, will be coming with us and will be running workshops for keen peer educators. So give NUAAs a call if you are interested.

NUAAs will also be visiting Armidale, Moree, Tamworth and other nearby areas to talk to local users and their supporters so give NUAAs a call if you live in these areas and would like to meet up with us and share all your expertise about local issues.

Coffs Harbour is holding a Peer Education Forum in the first week of July so give the NSP or NUAAs a call if you are interested.

So NUAAs hopes to see you somewhere in NSW soon!
